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
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News From the President



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Cooling System Maintenance

When was the last time you performed maintenance on your cooling system? Recently my water pump started to leak and I knew it was time to pull it off and do some repair work. Shown in the pictures below is what I found when I removed my upper radiator hose. The rust flakes continue to break loose even after years of cleaning attempts.

Several years ago, when I bought my Model A, I had to do some engine work to get it running. When I pulled the head off, I knew I was in for a lot of problems. Since then, I have cleaned the cooling passages in the cylinder head and block. I've used all kinds of flushing procedures as well numerous attempts to remove rust flakes and deposits from the cylinder block. The last time I had machine work done to the block, I decided to try filtering any remaining rust flakes that seemed to continue to break loose. After doing research, I discovered a company that makes a 2-part filter that fits in the upper radiator hose. The name of the filter is Gano Filter. Their filters are available in several sizes and a choice of polymer, brass, and aluminum. The Gano filters can be purchased directly from https://ganofilters.com. They are located in Escondido, CA. Before you install a Gano Filter, flush your cooling system thoroughly and make sure your radiator isn't clogged with rust flakes and grease. Grease accumulates from greasing the water pump when too much grease gets pumped past the rear bushing.

"Overall Appearance" What the Judges Look For

As an entrant and a judge, this area has a special "mystique" on how it is judged. "Overall Appearance" is the only area that has no "guidelines" as to what score a judge would put down. I'm hoping this article will take some of the mystery of how it is judged. Overall Appearance, is judged in every category. It can be the determining factor for "Best of Show" or an Award of Excellence. It is the judge's personal opinion/discretion if the entrant looks like they stepped into the judging room during our Model A era. Here is how I judge this area and what I look for in the entrant. As an entrant comes into the room, I immediately look for color, tones of fabrics, and is the outfit "complete" in my mind. Does the outfit require a hat, purse, coat, etc.? I'm not actually judging whether the individual areas are correct, but how the entrant has put together the complete outfit. Have they gone the extra "mile" with era style makeup, hair and nail polish? The major garment determines how I judge if the entrant has put together their outfit in my mind. Assuming from the above picture, the entrant is a woman as a point of discussion. I would not give her full points because my eyes are drawn to the hat and its' color. It's too bright a color for the outfit worn by the entrant. If it's evening or daytime, did they add a wrap, coat, fur, etc., did they carry gloves, and the style of purse and shoes helps determine the score. Did she wear leather shoes with an evening dress, or did they wear an evening hat with a daytime dress. I next look at the fit and year the entrant has put on their entry form. If it's a 1928, is the hemline at or below the knee? If it's a 1930, is the hem at mid-



calf. Length isn't the only area of concern. How tight is the bust and hip area? I'd deduct a point if it appears that the fabric is stretched in these areas. This is my opinion on what I look for in judging "Overall Appearance".

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Orange County Model A Ford Club ~ The First By: Lou Spielberger and Wade Forty Years (1955-1995) THE EARLY YEARS 1955

Roberts as told by Club members

According to Irvin I. Korn, the Orange County Model A Ford Club had its beginnings in Santa Ana in 1955. "There were six of us that had Model A's in 1955, me, Jerry Leonard, John Tulins and three others. We all wanted to get together with others who had A's so Jerry and I would drive around Orange County placing 3x5 cards on windshields letting people know when and where there would be a tire kicking session."

Those early meetings of the Club were held in parks such as Hart Park in Orange, Flower Street Park in Santa Ana, and at a coffee shop at Flower and 17th Street. "The restaurants loved us because when we parked our cars in their lots we brought in more business. They even gave us free meals!" Irvin Korn recalls. He also remembers meeting at the Isac Walton clubhouse and eight Marines from the Marine Band driving all the way from Camp Pendleton in Oceanside to attend a meeting. The Club met every Thursday and attendance grew very fast. "We had no dues, but we held a raffle at the end of each get together like the club does today. We were just like a family!" Korn says. (Wade-ask Korn about U S log of parts).

Korn recalls an early club tour to Idyllwild and Model A's passing new cars that were overheating. Tour speed was 45 to 50 miles per hour. It took Korn two days to get home from that tour "Patching my four-banger together with bubble gum and bailing wire." he complains. Another club tour in the early years, although Korn doesn't recall the year, was advertised to other clubs all over Southern California to meet at San Diego Zoo. "Six of us from Santa Ana traveled down to San Diego in our A's and upon entering the zoo parking lot, we saw another 50 A's waiting. By 10am there were 120! A few were from as far away as San Francisco. It was summer time and some had camped overnight. When we left the zoo, our carayan, which stretched two miles long, was given a police escort to the Orange County line. Most everyone was in costume" remembers Korn.

The newsletter in those days was written by the ladies of the club. Korn had a 1928 Model A pick up that was "mop" painted. In 1957, he entered the Air Force and upon returning home discovered his dad had sold it for \$47. Korn did see his beloved truck later at meets with its new San Diego owner. Other activities the club had in the 1950s included the Huntington Beach Independence Day Parade. "Our ladies would design and make costumes and, on parade day, they made breakfast and then everyone would tour in the parade. The kids loved it!" says Korn. A picnic basket auction was another way the Club raised money to operate. Korn remembers baskets going for as much as \$25. (Cont'd on Page 11)

ACCC Update

The new California traffic fine rules were released on January 1, 2019: Forget to carry your driver's license fine \$214. Forget to change the address (more than ten days) \$214. Uninsured car in an accident fine \$796, driver's license revoked for 4 years. Did not stop at red light or turning right at No Turn on red \$533. Crossing double yellow line fine \$425. Violation of the turn or U-turn \$284. Speeding I-15 miles \$224, 16-25 miles \$338, usually the police determine if the speed is over 5 miles. On rainy day it is not allowed to exceed 65 miles.

But wait, there's more! Like to 'California Stop' through stop signs? Stop sign but did not stop \$284. Pass the flashing light of school bus \$675. Talking on cell phone first time \$76, second time \$190, same penalty even if you are just holding the cell phone in your hand! Not stopping at a bus stop \$976—I'm not sure I understand this one! Not wearing a seat belt \$160. Driving with high beam light (from 30 points) for \$382. Child not wearing a seat belt or not in a child seat \$436. Covering car door \$178. Driving with headphones on \$178. Modified Exhaust \$1000 EACH stop (imagine--you could be stopped again on your way home from the first stop!).

The ACCC has indicated that all the above violations allow you to go to traffic school for 8 hours. If you get a second ticket within 18 months, sorry, you are not a Good Driver and this will drive up your insurance rate. That said, I have also read for the modified exhaust stop that it is not a moving violation so driving school won't make it go away, still going to cost you \$1,000.

A.B. 210 - a new bill was introduced by California Assemblyman Randy Voepel of the 71st District. In short A.B. 210 has been introduced to exempt motor vehicles prior to the 1983 model year from emissions inspection requirement. Current law requires the biennial testing of all 1976 and newer model-year vehicles. The bill awaits consideration by the Assembly Transportation Committee. A.B. 210 recognizes the minimal impact of pre-1983 vehicles on emissions and air quality. Pre-1983 vehicles constitute an insignificant portion of the overall vehicle population and are a poor source from which to look for emissions reduction. A.B. 210 endorses the fact that pre-1983 vehicles are overwhelmingly well-maintained and infrequently driven (a fraction of the miles each year as a new vehicle). The current exemption is for cars 1974 and older.

Castle Nuts and Cotter Pins

Was there a Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) in 1955? The following is from *The Restorer*: What was the *Model A Ford Club of America* doing in 1955? If you say that there was no MAFCA then you are right. But there was an up-and-coming *Model A Restorer Club of Southern California* struggling to get started, and less than two years later it became the *Model A Ford Club of America*. It was founded on October 16, 1955, when a group of Model A owners met in Glendale, California, in response to post cards sent out by "Red" Grow. The meeting was very informal and low key. No profound predictions were made. No one had a fleeting thought that the club being started for local Southern Californians would soon be national, let alone international in scope. Some of those present at that first gathering are still familiar names, although some are no longer with us: Claude "Red" Grow, Jack Payton, Bob White, Art Miller, Walter Joyce, and Vivian Payton (who is now, Vivian Hammer and still very active in the Queen Mary Chapter). Had the founders been even a little suspicious of the great future in store for their new club, they could not have chosen a better course of action than the one they followed in late 1955 and early 1956.

It was tempting to launch immediately into social activities, to take their cars out on the road and have FUN. But instead, they first took time to build a foundation for the club with a series of organizational meetings; one on Nov. 13, another on Dec. 4. At those important first meetings, by-laws were drafted, temporary officers elected, an operating fund started with voluntary donations, and headquarters established at Red Grow's used

car lot located at 6924 San Fernando Road in Glendale, the address used by the club until 1964 *** This was the beginning of our present international organization, with a total membership of 14,000 members. So, Happy Birthday MAFCA!!


