



Sorry to say there were other committee leaders who could not attend. Secretary Norm Kredit requested the approval of the January 14, 2021 Board minutes as e-mailed to all Board members. 
Darwin reported also that we have 144 members. All new members for 2021 can apply for free one year membership in MAFCA if they have never been members of MAFCA before.



When installing a radiator, Ford's Service Bulletins reminds you:

DO NOT DRAW RADIATOR BOLT NUTS DOWN TIGHTLY

When mounting a radiator do not draw the radiator bolt nuts down any farther than is necessary to lock the nut with the cotter key. If these nuts are drawn down tightly it compresses the radiator to frame bolt springs to such an extent that the flexible feature of the springs is defeated and damage to the radiator invariably results.





Henry Ford Trivia

Henry Ford was born on a farm in what later became Dearborn, Michigan on July 30, 1863. His father William, emigrated from Ireland to America in 1847 to eastern Michigan seeking a better life. He found employment as a worker on the family farm of a young girl, Mary Litogot O'Hern. Many years later William and Mary married and settled on a nearby farm. Henry was the oldest of six children. The children attended a

one-room school while also working on the farm. Henry never liked farming, but loved experimenting with gadgets,

especially taking apart watches and seeing if he could put them back together. Even though he didn't particularly care for farming chores he was always dreaming of making life easier. His mother convinced William to build a workbench for Henry to experiment with his gadgets. When he wasn't in school or helping with farm chores he could be found tinkering.

When he was seven, his father sent him to the Scotch Settlement School, where his mother had attended as a young girl. It was there he met Edsel Ruddiman, who became a lifelong friend.

Tragically, Henry's mother died in 1876, when he was thirteen. She was just thirty -seven and six young children were without their mother. Henry was grief stricken and later wrote "The house was like a watch without a mainspring".to be continued...

While in Florida, they took an opportunity to visit a restaurant they had heard about on the internet: Ford's Garage. Some of you may have seen Ford's Garage mentioned on Vintage Ford Forum or elsewhere, others maybe even have had the opportunity to dine there. However, if all this is news to you, continue reading to learn more about a neat restaurant you can visit on your next trip to either Indiana, Michigan, or Florida. Ford's Garage (www.fordsgarageusa.com) has 14 locations in Florida, I in Michigan, and I in Indiana.

Ford's Garage is a burger and craft beer restaurant that has a 1920's service station theme using Model A's and A parts. Each location has several Model A's on display as well as gas pumps, engines, wheels, and a variety of other Model A parts attached to the walls and set as display items. The bar area has prohibition-style elements of old brick, rich wood, and a hand-hammered copper bar top. There is even a Model A Tudor in the center of the bar on a lift with its wheels in motion. The dining area has a wonderful brick wall with a white-washed Ford's Garage logo that would look amazing in any club member's Model A cave.

The food was pretty good and the beer was cold. On the menu were several automotive and Model A themed items. And the final finish for the burgers? Well, even the burgers get a logo!

My First Model A

Buena Park was a little rural town of 3,500 people when we moved there in 1948. Knotts Berry Farm was the only point of interest at that time, famous for its chicken dinners and Boysen Berry pie. We walked to elementary school through 8th grade and rode a bus to Fullerton High School. Missed the bus? I hitch hiked until I got that treasured drivers license. I bought my Ist car soon after, a 1935 Ford coupe for \$40. But that is another story.

Commonwealth Avenue was a familiar route past the airport to school. It was small at that time with short runways, hangers at the West end and a farmer's plowed field beyond. Something in that field caught my eye one day, a 1930 Model A Ford Roadster. Model As were only 25 or 30 years old at that time with many on the road for work, school and 2^{nd} cars. I had even driven a couple and helped friends keep one running.

OK, time to see who owns that one and is it for sale. One of the aircraft mechanics said "Yeah, it belongs to Mike down there at the end". Mike, would you want to sell that old car out in the field? Well, I was going to "Fix it up" but I guess I would sell it. You can have it for what I paid for it, TEN DOLLARS" I didn't even try to bargain for a better price. \$25 dollars at the DMV and I had a real Model A all legal and in my name.

I rushed home, gathered up my friend Jerry, a length of rope and a 10dollar bill. My roadster came home. In a blink of the eye, I rounded up a 6V battery, a gallon of 17.9 cent a gallon gas, set the points and timing and was spinning donuts in the vacant field next door.

There were lots of vacant fields back then and to add to that they were building the 22 freeway at that time with lots of dirt to play in. I even took my mom on one of those rides. She joked about putting her hair in a ponytail, at 38 years old?

My plan was to build a hot rod with a V8. Uncle George worked at BB&H, an old respected parts store and automotive machine shop in Anaheim. He told me a customer dropped off a Model A engine for rebuild years ago and paid for it in advance. He never came back and they lost his contact info, so, he dropped it off at my house, a professionally rebuilt short block.

That engine sat in dad's garage for months while I dreamed of that hot rod with a V8. Dad got tired to moving it around and took a load to the dump Not only my new engine but a large oak ice box you now see in antique stores for \$800-\$1000 shared space 100 feet deep in the now called land fill. Wipe that tear from your cheek.

All was not lost. I sold it for \$35 and got my money back. Is that another tear?

ACCC Update

Another year, another set of rules to follow. It seems the lawmakers in Sacramento have been busy doing more than creating ideas of how to keep us at home. When you get your Model A or modern iron out, you should know that there are some new roadway safety laws that have taken effect in 2021.

License points for distracted driving (AB 47, Daly; 2019): Using a cell phone in a handheld manner while driving is currently punishable by a fine. Beginning July 1, 2021, violating the hands-free law for a second time within 36 months of a prior conviction for the same offense will result in a point being added to a driver's record. This applies to the violations of talking or texting while driving (except for hands-free use) and to any use of these devices while driving by a person under 18 years of age.

Unattended children in motor vehicles (AB 2717, Chau): Exempts a person from civil or criminal liability for trespassing or damaging a vehicle when rescuing a child who is 6 years old or younger and who is in immediate danger from heat, cold, lack of ventilation, or other dangerous circumstances. The law takes effect January I, 2021.

"Move Over, Slow Down" amendments (AB 2285, Transportation Committee): Extends the provisions of the "Move Over, Slow Down" law currently in place on freeways to also apply to local streets and roads so drivers approaching a stationary emergency vehicle displaying emergency lights, including tow trucks and Caltrans vehicles, must now move to another lane when possible, or slow to a reasonable speed on all highways, not just freeways. The law is effective January 1, 2021.

Emergency vehicles (SB 909, Dodd): Allows authorized emergency vehicles to use a "Hi-Lo" warning sound. This distinctive sound, different than a siren, would be used to notify the public of an immediate need to evacuate an area in an emergency. The CHP is currently developing regulations to standardize the Hi-Lo warning sound statewide. Until the regulations are adopted, law enforcement agencies can use the Hi-Lo warning sound by obtaining a permit from the CHP. The law went into effect September 29, 2020. The ACCC has been pretty quiet since January of 2020—there has been no newsletter or updates from them since that time. I stumbled onto these new laws on the internet somewhere and thought they would be interesting to share. Be safe!

May you always have love to share, health to spare, and friends that care


