"Fall is Just Around the Corner"

As Winter is fast approaching, I'd like to show the styles of women's daytime coats from 1928-1931. During the Model A era, women's fashion styles changed dramatically in just those 4 years. Paris and New York were the style centers that dictated the most up to date chic styles that the modern era woman would wear. Generally, 1928-1929, the styles were boxy and straight across the bottom hems with no distinct waistline in dresses. Also, during these two years, dress hemlines were shorter than the early 20's. When the stock market crashed in 1929,



so too did the hemlines. They became a little shorter, and many styles had uneven hemlines, or handkerchief sides to give the styles more flair.

Coats in 1928-1929 had hemlines that generally were straight across the front. Some did have thin belts, but some followed the dress fashions of 1929 by having flairs on either side of the coat. Many coats during our era had no buttons but were held shut by the wearer. Furs often trimmed the collars and sleeves in a wide variety of skins. Intricate detailing on the coat was often done with piping, trims, pleats, embroidery, etc. Also note that these coats are just barely covering any dress worn under it.

Compare the 1928-29 coat lengths to the 1930-31 lengths. By 1930, coat hemlines dropped

drastically...at least 3 inches from 1928-1929. Waist bands in dresses were beginning to be shown in many fashion houses as well as coats during 1930. Fur trimmed coats continued on in 1930, as well as in (Cont'd on Page7)

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(Cont'd from Page 2) 1931. Cape collars were starting to become popular in coats, just like the bertha collars in many of our dresses. Fabrics like wool, tweed, plush, and twill were used for winter coats. Being for winter, coats tended to be fully lined, many in heavy silk satin for warmth. Heavier coats often had padded inner linings for those colder climates. Style, detailing, and fur enhancements continued in 1930. Full fur coats were also very



garment will enhance your outfit when being judged. Remember that "texture" is key. An example would be a heavy fabric of your major garment would go with any of these coats. A wool, heavy crepe and velvet would be suggested. A fine silk, georgette, or light crepe would be too light for these heavy winter coats.

popular during all 4 years, but there were very few styles that were belted. Most used buttons or hook and eyes to keep the fronts closed. In 1931 it appears that hemlines dropped even further, possibly another 2 inches. Belts became wider and bolder in appearance on coats. Raglan/ dolman sleeves were becoming more prevalent in fashions as well as coats. Fabrics still remained the same in all 4 years as well as coats being trimmed in all kinds of animal pelts. 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Jim's Technical Tip

There are several places on a Model A where you are installing something that is attached with multiple screws. For example, here are a few:

- Instrument panel
- Floor boards
- □ Valve cover (under exhaust manifold)
- Oil pan

Window trim

When installing them, start each screw with only a few threads. Leave them all pretty loose to start. Then you can move the piece around, as needed, to finesse each subsequent screw into the next threaded hole. The last ones are often the

hardest to get aligned. I use an awl in the hole where the screw will be going to adjust the piece to get the holes to line up.

Get all of the screws started, and then go around and tighten them all up in several passes. Have the screw head just touching the piece at first, then make them all snug, then make them all fully tightened. Just like



you do when tightening head nuts, start with tightening the screws in the middle and then work your way out to the ends. Alternate sides left and right as you go on each tightening pass. I hope this helps you get things together a bit faster and easier next time.

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Adjusting Shock Absorbers

The pointer on the shock absorber needle valve has been removed and the end of the valve slotted so that it can be easily turned with a screw driver. (See Fig 573) The numerals which were stamped on the shock absorber arm have also been removed as they are no longer required.

Slotting the end of the needle valve instead of using the pointer simplifies adjustment and prevents any possibility of the brake rod striking the needle valve.



Adjustment:

Turning the slotted end of the valve changes the adjustment. Resistance is increased when the needle valve is screwed in, and decreased when the valve is backed out.

The average adjustment for rear shock absorbers during warm weather is made as follows: Screw needle valve in until it seats, then back valve off 1/4 turn. For front shock absorbers, back valve off 3/8 of a turn.

For cold weather adjustment the needle valve in the rear shock absorbers should be screwed in until it seats, then backed off 1/2 to 5/8 of a turn. For the front shock absorbers the needle valve should be backed off 5/8 to 3/4 of a turn.

These settings are of course only approximate and can be easily changed to suit the individual preference of the owner and the conditions under which the car is operated. For example, the owner who drives are high speed over rough roads would require greater shock absorber resistance than the owner who drives at moderate speed over paved highways.

Dealers mechanics must check owners' cars and adjust shock absorbers to secure maximum riding qualities for the conditions under which the car is operated.

Brake Rod Striking Pointer:

Should you receive a complaint of a brake rod striking the needle valve equipped with the old style pointer, replace the needle valve with the one having the new slotted end — this will correct the trouble. The needle valve can be easily removed by screwing it out. In a case of this kind if it is necessary to change on needle valve, all four valves should be changed in order to preserve a uniform appearance and have a uniform method of adjustment.

Shock Absorber Adjustment:

Cold weather adjustment for cars equipped with shock absorbers having square end needle valve is made as follows:

Rear shock absorbers—Screw needle valve in until it seats, then back valve off 1/2 to 5/8 of a turn.

Front shock absorbers—screw needle valve in until it seats, then back valve off 3/8 of a turn.

Shock absorbers provided with needle valve pointers—set rears at 3 to 4, fronts 2 to 3.

Check level of glycerine in reservoir. Every 5000 miles the level of the glycerine in the reservoir should be brought up to the filler plug opening.
