



You buy the graphite in a small tube with a pointed tip, you insert the tip into the key hole




and "puff" some graphite into the lock. Then you insert and remove the key several times to work the graphite into the lock tumblers, and operate the lock a few times. Jim Cannon

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It Happened in a Heartbeat

First, a bit of history. My daughter and I have been my mother's primary caretakers since she had back surgery several months ago. At first, I would stay one night and go home the next. After a month, we decided it would be better if I stayed fulltime. I had not been home since before Thanksgiving so my husband, Bill Hatcher, would "visit" me most days.



On December 7th, I just wanted to spend the night at my home, in my own bed. On the rare occasion when I would do this, I would usually go back to my daughter's home early the next morning. However, on this day, I decided to see if my husband wanted to have breakfast together. He's one of those people we all admire/hate who goes to the gym for two hours, three times a week, like clockwork.

goes to the gym for two hours, three times a week, like clockwork. Bill came home a few minutes earlier on this day, was wobbling and sweating, saying he didn't feel well. He sat down and we took his blood pressure – 70/40. Neither of us have a medical background but I knew his blood pressure was too low and wanted him to go to Urgent Care. Being a typical man, he elected to wait a few minutes and re-check it. Ten minutes later, his blood pressure was 119/74 (normal). I thought everything was fine when he said he was hungry and was going to have some cereal. Sitting two feet away from him, I looked away and when I looked back, Bill had slumped forward. I called his name and pushed him back, while pressing hard on his

sternum. When I saw he wasn't responding, I quickly realized we were in trouble . . . he was having a heart attack. In my haste to call 911, I misdialed 9911. I took a breath, told myself to calm down, redialed, dropped the phone and screamed our address into the phone.

Pulling my husband to the floor, I immediately began CPR. I could hear his ribs breaking as I continued CPR. Eight minutes is a lifetime. At one point, I didn't think I could go on. When would help arrive? Finally, the 911 operator responded, "Open the door". Nine people came rushing in - there were paramedics, firemen, and police. As they worked on him, I grabbed medications and answered questions. Placing him on a backboard with a machine continuing to perform CPR, I watched from the door as they put the love of my life in an ambulance and were gone in a moment

There were some scary hours/days ahead, however on Christmas Day, my very special husband came home; best Christmas present ever. All the medical personnel said it was a miracle he survived. He is a bit weak from sitting in a hospital bed for an extended period of time but has no deficits, mentally or physically. He ribs are painful and he frequently holds a pillow to his chest if he must cough or sneeze. I think he just wants to remind me that I hurt him.

Approximately 35 years ago, when I was just a spring chicken, I took CPR training at the Red Cross. Since then, I have re-certified 3-4 times. Never did I think I would need to use the training after retirement.

The reason I share this story with you today is because I urge everyone, meaning you and all your family members to take a CPR course. They are offered through the Red Cross or your local fire department. It takes about half a day to go through the training session, however, you may just save the life of someone very precious to you.

Since Bill's admission to the hospital, almost every doctor and nurse has commented upon the fact I performed the CPR. I thought it was because my husband mentions his chest pain whenever he is asked to move about. But, in speaking with one of the RN's recently, she stated in all the years she has worked at the hospital, she has never known of a family member who performed CPR. She said most people freeze and wait valuable minutes for the paramedics to arrive and began life-saving measures; don't be that person. Take the training so you will know what to do if something so terrifying should happen to your spouse, child or grandchild.

Our latest "seminar", which was really just a time of club members helping Don Dormeyer to get his Tudor motor reassembled and his car back on the road, turned out to be a great time of friends helping friends. The turnout was fantastic, maybe one of the best. I deeply appreciate all that attended and helped out. And I'm SURE that Don does also. Thank you, one and all.

Don's engine has been torn apart for several years while replacing several damaged valves and valve guides. He and several other members had taken care of most of the hard work beforehand. What was mostly left was installing the valve cover, the head, the intake/exhaust manifolds, etc.

Our "pie-in-the-sky" hopes were that we'd actually be able to hear Don's old girl fire up once again. But, as is all too common, that was not to be. One thing I've learned through the years is, things OFTEN pop up that have to be addressed before all finish work can be completed...and this one was no exception. Nothing critical. Just enough to postpone hearing the old girl come back to life once again today...

The main thing that really stopped us was when we checked the exhaust manifold for the alignment of all the ports. Turned out, they were quite a distance off. And then, as if that wasn't enough, the coup de grace was a rather large crack in the manifold. "Curses!!! Foiled again!/!" Don now has a nice piece of "Wall Art" for his garage. Hopefully we'll have a new manifold in the next couple of days and we'll be able to finish.

We're not that far off from completion, and hopefully sometime this next week we'll have all the remaining items and Don will be able to drive his old girl on the street for the first time in several years. Should be a VERY happy moment.

One last shout-out to Don's wife, Mary, for graciously making hot dogs, sandwiches, and deserts for everyone. Thank you very much...

Thank you once again, to everyone who so kindly lent their expertise today. To me, this is exactly what being a club member is all about.


