Highlights of the Sept. Tech Seminar

On September 10th Rick Hall gave a great technical seminar on fuel leaks starting at the bottom of the gas tank all of the way to the carburetor. A lot of twists and turns with points of failure along the way. The two main culprits for leaks are rust and sediment in the gas tank, or gas lines not mating up properly at connection points.

When it comes to the gas tank that has rust problems, the ideal course of action is to pull it and have it professionally cleaned and sealed; this can normally be accomplished by a radiator repair shop. Of course this is not always possible, so filling and draining several times accompanied by a de-rusting agent until it drains clear. A good preventative is to add a gas tank screen at the fuel shut-off valve, as well as in the sediment bowl. An interesting idea mentioned by rick is to place several magnets around the

shut-off valve area of the gas tank which will help collect rust particles (and the same can be done on the bottom of the oil pan).

As far as leaks outside of the gas tank, the first point of failure is the fuel shut-off valve; replace with a new one or rebuild/repair (a much more economical solution!). Also, as some have found, new is not always better, so a repair route might be the way to go, and Rick went into detail in this area, and sometimes the use of course polishing compound or fine valve grinding compound. Lubrication of the valve can be accomplished by using "EZ Turn Lubricant"

For those that have problems with leaks with the inside fuel line, be sure mating surfaces are smooth and clean. If the mating surfaces don't kiss each other without manipulating the fuel line, a leak may occur as the threads are designed to "reinforce" the connection, not "force" the connection. But, if you want peace of mind, use a product discussed called "Gasoila" on the threads – do not use Teflon tape as particles can eventually work their way into the fuel line and clog up your carburetor.

Under the hood, we discussed the sediment bowl, both solid and glass. Periodically draining some gas from the bowl to release any sediment build up should be done for preventative maintenance at least annually. Rebuild kits are available if there is a leak there, or purchase a new one. Again, make sure mating surfaces are in good shape. The fuel line from the sediment bowl to the carburetor are treated much the same as the inside fuel line. Threads on fittings and the ferrules need to be in good condition. A discussion on the one-piece fitting and ferrule vice the two-piece where the ferrule is separate came up, and all are in agreement that the two-piece is the way to go as the one piece invention, while maybe convenient, is very prone to leaking – the exact thing we are trying to prevent! Again, no Teflon tape here, but Gasoila or a non-hardening thread sealant maybe an alternative if you are having some leaking and all other boxes are checked off.

Lastly, discussion in areas on the carburetor was an area of focus. Starting with the mating surface of the ferrule, to the bowl gaskets, screen gaskets, and main jet gaskets, as well as the fuel screen/filter. Leveling the float using valve shim gaskets (and NOT bending anything). An interesting point was checking the dimple where the float rubs against float valve; ensure this area is smooth or it may cause the float to hang up and prevent it from closing. Other areas included cleaning and burnishing the float valve and adjusting the main jet and cap jet height.

A very comprehensive seminar on points of failure that can cause a fuel leak. A big thank you to both Rick and Louise for hosting us once again at their beautiful home! Next seminar will be on rebuilding/replacing a fuel gauge as well as adjusting that pesky booger to be accurate (ok, somewhat accurate). Location will be at Mike and Chrisanne Edmonson's home on October 15th; donuts and coffee at 8:30am, start time at 9:00am.





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The Ahooguh Origin

The ahooguh horn, also known as a Klaxon horn was developed and patented by Miller Reese Hutchison, an inventor of the early 20th century. Hutch, as he was known, patented the mechanism in 1908. The Lovell-McConnell Manufacturing Company of Newark, New Jersey bought the rights to manufacture the device and it later became standard equipment on motor cars. Franklyn Hallett Lovell Jr., the company founder, coined the name klaxon from the Ancient Greek verb klazō, meaning shriek. Klaxon horns produce an easily identifiable sound, often described in English as "ahooguh". Like most mechanical horns, the klaxon has largely been replaced by solidstate electronic devises, though the memorable tone has persisted on in classic cars of the era. Klaxon later became a brand name. The Klaxon horn was used on U.S. submarines during WWII. The Klaxon horn's characteristic sound is produced by a springsteel diaphragm with a rivet in the center that is repeatedly struck by the teeth of a rotating cogwheel. The diaphragm is attached to a horn that acts as an acoustic transformer and controls the direction of the sound. In the first Klaxons, the wheel was driven either by hand or by an electric motor. Hutchison went to work for Thomas Edison in 1909, and was the chief engineer for Edison from 1912 to 1918. The ahooguh sound is usually heard today when a Model A Ford goes rolling down the road.

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ACCC Update

The Covid virus that gripped the Association of California Car Clubs (ACCC) has finally waned! In May, the ACCC finally put together an updated newsletter and they appeared to be back in business. Or so I thought—there hasn't been any additional newsletter or updates from them since May. So, taking some of the *recent*-ish information from the ACCC Newsletter and doing some research myself, I have some information for you.

California Passes Law to Ban the Sale of NEW Gas-Powered Cars in 2035

If you haven't heard this by now, well here it is—a timeline to ban gasoline car sales. The irony of the announcement was that the following day Californians were asked not to charge their electric vehicles due to high temperatures and stress on the electrical grid.

This is not the first time there has been a deadline for sale of electric vehicles in California. In 1990, California Air Resources Board passed the Zero Emissions Mandate whereby 2% of vehicles sold had to be electric by 1998. That date came and went. Going further back, in 1976 the Hybrid & Electric Vehicle Act directed that we have an 'all electric economy' by the year 2000. That didn't happen either. However, maybe it is time—innovation is almost always good.

Speaking of innovation--for those that have Range Anxiety over electric cars, a conference I attended this week reported on a Tesla Model S that was fitted with an aftermarket battery from startup company, Our Next Energy, achieved 752 miles on a single charge. Try that with a single tank in your gas powered car!

You may be surprised to hear that Battery Electric Vehicles surpassed 8% of total vehicles sold in June of 2022 (source: CollisionWeek). Tesla isn't the only electric vehicle manufacturer, you may have seen Rivians and Karmas on the road, but you will soon see cars from Lucid, VinFast and more quietly moving through our streets. That doesn't even count the electric vehicles from the car companies you already recognize (i.e. Ford).

There are 17 States set to make a decision in the near term whether to follow California's 2035 decision or to go their own pace. Obstacles to making the leap to electric are numerous: raw materials for making batteries (Copper, Cobalt, Lithium, etc) are in short supply and expensive, the recharging network is limited outside of California, and electrical generation capacity likely will struggle if not improved. One of the conference speakers suggested that the US needs to reconsider its position on Nuclear Power Generation in order to shore up the capacity demands if we electrify. All this and it does not consider whether consumers want this to happen—another potential headwind.

For our Model A's—don't worry, there will still be gasoline in the year 2035. Projections are that 89.2% of the vehicles on the road in the US will NOT be electric (Source: Schwartz Advisors, presented at CAWA 2-2022). While there are alternate power sources such as Hydrogen, Propane, and Natural Gas, I expect a large portion of the 89% to be traditional gasoline internal combustion engines. For now, just fill 'er up and continue to enjoy your A!


